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I. NEWS & VIEWS

ONTARIO

1. NURSING MOMS NEED MORE SUPPORT: TORONTO

Dr. David McKeown, Toronto's Medical Officer of Health, wants the city's hospitals to do more to support women who choose to breastfeed (CBC, 2010, March 16). According to a study of 1,500 first-time mothers by Toronto Public Health, most new mothers tried breastfeeding in the hospital but only about 63% were still doing it exclusively by the time they were discharged. Six months later, only 17.5% of the mothers were not supplementing their child's diet with formula.

2. LATEST PRODUCT RECALLS

(also available in French)

Note: Products that are recalled for containing lead or barium are in excess of the allowable level per the Canadian Hazardous Products Act (CHPA).

- Foam Animal Puzzle by Daouco Canada: Contains small parts that pose a choking hazard to young children.
- Allreds Design Baby Bracelets and Pacifier Clips: Contain lead.
- Eyeglasses Cases for Children: Paint on the green eyeglasses cases contain lead.
- GUND Baby Paperboard Books: Tyrofoam material used to affix the plastic handle/baby rattle to
 the book can become separated from the book binding when chewed or pulled at. The
 releasable pieces of styrofoam pose choking and aspiration hazards to infants and young
 children.
- Garage Beaded String Bracelet and Antique Silver Bracelet: Contain lead.
- Evenflo, Top-of-Stair Plus Wood Gate: Wooden slats on the gate can break or detach, posing a fall hazard when the gate is used at the top of a staircase.
- Infantino SlingRider and Wendy Bellissimo Infant Sling Carriers: Fabric of the sling and adult's body can press against the infant's nose and mouth blocking breathing; this poses a risk of suffocation or asphyxiation.
- Nike Bauer Junior and Youth Hockey Stick (updated): contains lead.
- Graco Harmony High Chair: Poses both fall and choking hazards to children.
- Health Canada reminds parents, grandparents, and caregivers to discard older Fisher-Price "Little People" Figurines manufactured before 1991.
- Health Canada reminds Canadian of the importance of reporting incidents related to consumer products.

INTERNATIONAL

3. FETAL ALCOHOL SYNDROME (FAS) DECLINES AMONG ALASKA NATIVES

This article (Shinohara, 2010, February 20) reports that a \$29-million program, which included a multimedia education campaign is being credited with a 32% decline in FAS among Native Americans in Alaska. According to state officials the rate of children born with FAS among native populations declined from about 20 per 10,000 births in 1996 to 13.5 in 2002 and there were fewer children born with alcohol spectrum disorders.

4. OVERWEIGHT BABIES MAY HAVE DELAYED MOTOR SKILLS

A doctoral student in nutrition epidemiology at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and her colleagues evaluated 215 infants at various times up to 18 months. A total of 152 infants were found to be overweight during any of these evaluations. A total of 20% of the overweight infants had delayed motor skills such as inability to sit steadily for 30 seconds.

II. RECENT REPORTS AND RESEARCH

ONTARIO

5. VOICES FROM THE FIELD: ABORIGINAL CHILDREN AND OBESITY

Melanie Ferris, a First Nations Mother and Aboriginal Health Promotion Consultant for the Best Start Resource Centre, shares some information on what she has learned during her work on childhood obesity through the project "Let's Be Healthy Together: Preventing Childhood Obesity in Ontario's Aboriginal Communities". First Nations, Inuit, and Métis people have worked together to design the culturally appropriate toolkit and training package that helps parents and communities prevent childhood obesity in Aboriginal children between the ages of zero and six. Melanie shares why obesity in Aboriginal children is such a concern; how the research findings in the papers from the Centre of Excellence for Early Childhood Development influence her work; and gaps among research, practice, and policy and how to overcome these gaps.

6. THE INDIAN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT'S COMMON EXPERIENCE PAYMENT (CEP) AND HEALING: A QUALITATIVE STUDY EXPLORING IMPACTS ON RECIPIENTS

The Aboriginal Healing Foundation (AHF) (2010) released a follow-up to the 2007 AHF report "Lump Sum Compensation Payments Research Project". This new report covers the ways in which survivors of abuses in the Indian Residential Schools System have been impacted by the CEP, a component of the 2007 Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement. The findings are mainly based on interviews with 281 First Nations, Inuit, and Métis Survivors from across Canada, who applied for or received CEPs.

An environmental scan of government services aimed at Settlement Agreement beneficiaries and interviews with AHF-funded project staff in communities were also conducted. Results were quantified where possible to determine the priority of impacts, reactions, and options. The findings indicate that decisions around the ineligibility of certain schools (e.g., some schools, hostels, and group homes) were not well understood in communities. Participants generally agreed that the compensation process seemed inconsistent, leaving them at the mercy of an outside agency. Almost half of the study group said that receiving compensation was both a positive and a negative experience. "More Survivors described positive types of impacts of payments than did those who described negative impacts; however, this *frequency* should not be confused with *magnitude*. The negative impacts described by participants were profoundly destructive for many Survivors and their families, and in some communities greatly outweighed any positive, material benefits of the payments" (AHF, 2010, p. 16). For example, over a third of participants shared that the CEP process triggered negative emotions or traumatic flashbacks. Almost half of participants said that compensation made no difference to their well-being, noting that there is no connection between money and healing and no amount of compensation can replace what was lost.

7. STATISTICAL PORTRAIT OF THE FRENCH-SPEAKING IMMIGRANT POPULATION OUTSIDE QUEBEC (1991 TO 2006)

(also available in French)

This report discusses French-language immigration outside Quebec and its recent evolution, including numbers, geographic distribution, and demographic and social characteristics. The Francophone immigrant population outside Quebec is comprised of two groups: those who have only French as their first official language spoken (French FOLS immigrants) and those who have both French and English (French-English FOLS immigrants). In Canada outside Quebec, French-English FOLS immigrants (76,100) are slightly are slightly more numerous than French FOLS immigrants (60,900). A total of 70% of Francophone immigrants outside Québec are concentrated in Ontario. Two-thirds of French-speaking immigrants live in three areas: Toronto, Ottawa, and Vancouver.
