2. Shane Koyczan's 'To This Day' Anti-Bullying Poem, Goes Viral

Shane Koyczan's own experiences with bullying inspired him to try to raise awareness about the widespread problem through his "To This Day" anti-bullying project. He invited artists to animate his spoken-word poem. Each artist contributed 20-second clips that were combined to create a seven-minute video. The video has already been viewed more than 4.3 million times. It shares the stories of bullied children, the trauma of isolated youth, the battle to overcome emotional scars, and the hope for a better tomorrow.

* 3. Maternal Alcohol Use and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome and Infant Mortality Excluding SIDS

ABSTRACT:

Background: Improvements in the rate of infant mortality (death in first year of life) have not occurred in recent years. This study investigates the association between maternal alcohol-use disorder and sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) and infant mortality not classified as SIDS using linked, population-based health and mortality data.

Methods: Exposed mothers were identified through the presence of an *International Classification of Diseases* 9/10 alcohol diagnosis, a proxy for alcohol-use disorder, recorded on health, mental health, and/or drug and alcohol datasets (1983–2005). Comparison mothers without an alcohol diagnosis were frequency matched to exposed mothers on maternal age within maternal race and year of birth of their children. All offspring with their birth recorded on the Midwives Notification System compose the exposed ($n = 21\,841$) and comparison ($n = 56\,054$) cohorts. Cases of SIDS (n = 303) and infant mortality excluding SIDS (n = 598) were identified through linkage with the Western Australian Mortality Register. Analyses were conducted by using Cox regression and results presented as adjusted hazard ratios (aHRs) and 95% confidence intervals (CIs).

Results: The highest risk of SIDS occurred when a maternal alcohol diagnosis was recorded during pregnancy (aHR 6.92, 95% CI 4.02–11.90) or within 1 year postpregnancy (aHR 8.61, 95% CI 5.04–14.69). An alcohol diagnosis recorded during pregnancy more than doubled the risk of infant deaths (excluding SIDS) (aHR 2.35, 95% CI 1.45–3.83). Maternal alcohol-use disorder is attributable for at least 16.41% (95% CI 9.73%–23.69%) of SIDS and 3.40% (95% CI 2.28%–4.67%) of infant deaths not classified as SIDS.

Conclusions: Maternal alcohol-use disorder is a significant risk factor for SIDS and infant mortality excluding SIDS. <u>http://pediatrics.aappublications.org/content/early/2013/02/20/peds.2012-1907.abstract</u>

* 4. The Relationship Between Multiple Sex Partners and Anxiety, Depression, and Substance Dependence Disorders: A Cohort Study

ABSTRACT:

Changes in sexual behavior have resulted in longer periods of multiple serial or concurrent relationships. This study investigated the effects of multiple heterosexual partners on mental health, specifically, whether higher numbers of partners were linked to later anxiety, depression, and substance dependency. Data from the Dunedin Multidisciplinary Health and Development Study, a prospective, longitudinal study of a birth cohort born in 1972–1973 in Dunedin, New Zealand were used. The relationship between numbers of sex partners over three age periods (18-20, 21-25, and 26-32 years) and diagnoses of anxiety, depression, and substance dependence disorder at 21, 26, and 32 years were examined, using logistic regression. Interaction by gender was examined. Adjustment was made for prior mental health status. There was no significant association between number of sex partners and later anxiety and depression. Increasing numbers of sex partners were associated with increasing risk of substance dependence disorder at all three ages. The association was stronger for women and remained after adjusting for prior disorder. For women reporting 2.5 or more partners per year, compared to 0–1 partners, the adjusted odd ratios (and 95 % CIs) were 9.6 (4.4–20.9), 7.3 (2.5–21.3), and 17.5 (3.5–88.1) at 21, 26, and 32 years, respectively. Analyses using new cases of these disorders showed similar patterns. This study established a strong association between number of sex partners and later substance disorder, especially for women, which persisted beyond prior substance use and mental health problems more generally. The reasons for this association deserve investigation.

5. Show Your Love

"Show Your Love" is a national campaign designed to improve the health of women and babies by promoting preconception health and healthcare (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 2013). The campaign's main goal is to increase the number of women who plan their pregnancies and engage in healthy behaviors *before* becoming pregnant. For those women who don't want to start a family in the near future or at all, the

campaign encourages them to choose healthy behaviors so that they can be their best and achieve the goals and dreams they have set for themselves. The Show Your Love campaign was launched on Valentine's Day and will run through National Women's Health Week in May. The campaign includes tailored materials for women who are planning a pregnancy in the next couple of years, and those who are not.
