

# Goals of the 18-Month Well-Baby Visit

- Monitor growth and development using Nipissing District Developmental Screen (NDDS) and Rourke Baby Record
- Address parental concern about healthy child development and behaviour
- Provide information about parenting and other community programs that promote healthy child development and early learning
- Refer to specialized services when needed so children have access to interventions earlier
- Develop effective partnerships amongst parents, primary care providers, and community services

## Autism Program - Children's Hospital of Eastern **Ontario (CHEO)**

- All children referred to the program must have an existing diagnosis on the Autism Spectrum
- Austim Intervention Program (AIP) Intensive Behavioural Intervention (IBI) services to children towards the severe end of autism spectrum *School Support Program (SSP)* - Through Connections for Students, supports the seamless transition from IBI to publicly funded schools, using Applied Behaviour Analysis (ABA) instructional techniques
- ABA Services and Supports Program Services to children by teaching techniques within 4 domains of communication, daily living skills, social skills and self regulation/behaviour

#### **Blind-Low Vision Program**

- Provides education and support for parents with blind or low vision ► children
- Supports parents to help their children develop skills they need for daily activities at home and in early learning and care settings

#### **Baby Express and Breastfeeding Support Drop-ins**

- Baby Express Drop-ins: Offers breastfeeding and well baby support by a public health nurse for infants under one year of age
- Breastfeeding Support Drop-ins: Offers breastfeeding support by a lactation consultant

## **Centre Psychosocial**

Provides mental health services in French to families and their children

## **Child Care Information Centralized Waiting List (CWL)**

- Bilingual non-profit child care information and referral service on early learning and child care
- For families seeking licensed child care spaces, the CWL simplifies the process by allowing parents/guardians to register their children on the waiting list of several child care services in one step

## **Children in Need of Treatment (CINOT)**

Free, urgent and essential dental services to eligible children aged 17 and under whose parents have no dental insurance and cannot afford the cost of urgent dental care

> Provides free, confidential information and referral to community and social services
